Nagoya City University 2015 Autumn Semester Matriculation Ceremony




Nagoya City University (NCU) promotes globalization. Accordingly, this ceremony will be conducted in both Japanese and English.


Starting this autumn, NCU's graduate schools have also begun offering entrance examinations for autumn enrollment. This time, 13 students have enrolled in our graduate programs: 11 students in the medical sciences and 2 students in the pharmaceutical sciences. Of those students, there are 4 international students, including Government one Japanese Scholarship Student. I expect the number of enrolling international students to increase in the years ahead as NCU works to recruit top students from abroad




In 1950, NCU was established as a public university by integrating the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, founded in 1884, and the Medical School, founded in 1943. Since then, NCU has developed as a university and is currently comprised of 6 faculties and 7 graduate schools. 10 years ago, NCU became a public university corporation. It continues to evolve as it looks to the future.



NCU has 4 campuses, Sakurayama, Takiko, Tanabe-dori, and Kita Chikusa. Despite the inconvenience of having separate campuses, our students, teachers, and staff of all faculties will continue working as one united NCU as the university takes its next leap forward.




In connection with the idea of unity, I would like to mention *The Charter of Nagoya City University*, which was established last year on NCU's Foundation Day, October 28th. The Charter is to our university what a constitution is to a country. Each of the university's faculties has its own individual specialization and history, and NCU's charter guides them to cooperate in achieving the same vision for the future.



At the same time as the Charter was established, we also finalized the *Future Plan of Nagoya City University*. Based on the principles of the Charter, the Future Plan looks ahead 15 years. 15 years from now must seem like the distant future. At that time, the Linear Chuo Shinkansen will have shortened transit between Tokyo and Nagoya to just 40 minutes, and the townscape of Nagoya may have undergone drastic changes.

We have distributed summaries of the Charter and the Future Plan to you today. On this occasion, I want you to take interest in the plan. I appreciate your great support in achieving its vision for the future.



The Future Plan of Nagoya City University puts forth four visions. They are

NCU in which citizens feel pride and affinity, NCU which keeps developing with Nagoya City,

NCU which takes a strategic approach in advancing on the world stage,

NCU with a stable foundation of management.

The Future Plan of Nagoya City University specifies 52 plans based on these four visions. Of those, I would like to introduce five plans which are of importance to you in your

research and studies as graduate students.




The first of these plans is titled *Engendering* affection for the university, and building 70th momentum toward 2020. NCU's anniversary. Having pride and affection for NCU should not be limited to the university's students, faculty and staff, alumni, and their families; it should extend to local citizens as well. NCU celebrates its 65th anniversary this year, and we are commemorating it through events for international development in cooperation with the local community and companies. These are not simply one-year events. Instead, they connect to projects for the 70th and 80th anniversaries and the steady implementation of the Future Plan.



NCU aims to become a world-leading university in research, education, and medical treatment. Your effort for productive research plays an essential role in NCU attaining and maintaining a top position in the world university rankings. I expect each of you to do your best.



With regard to research, NCU is establishing a research promotion headquarter to strategically support cutting-edge research. We would like to share the fruits of NCU's research with the world.



With the idea that quality research requires sufficient funding, NCU endeavors to acquire funds strategically. This leads to improved research, resulting in a greater number of highly evaluated papers being written. These excellent papers then lead to the acquisition of more research funds. I refer to this as the research funding cycle, and consider it important for the improvement of research at NCU.



NCU is making an action plan for globalization and has enriched the function of its International Exchange Center. We are also promoting globalization in education and research. I believe that two important points for conducting excellent research are having the courage to try and acting with originality.
